Chair's Review A return to the green

Golf in Scotland is in rude health at present, due in no small part to the commitment of clubs, players, coaches and the team at Scottish Golf.

It is testament to the popularity of golf that its resurgence has occurred during two of the most volatile and unpredictable years in recent history. We all thought we would be out of the pandemic woods by now, enjoying old freedoms and a return to some semblance of normality. We may have a little way to go, but hopefully the worst is behind us. As Scottish Golf's new Chair, I am enormously proud to have joined an organisation – and a sporting community – that has demonstrated resilience, energy and adaptability in ever-changing circumstances. Golf in Scotland is in rude health at present, due in no small part to the commitment of clubs, players, coaches and the team at Scottish Golf.

We are over a year into the World Handicap System (WHS) now, and while the rollout has presented its challenges, the implementation of a brand new, fully-operational scoring system has largely been a success. Scottish Golf's WHS team have worked tirelessly to offer real-time support to club members and casual golfers alike, ensuring a nearly seamless transition to the new system.

In 2021, Scottish Golf maintained its commitment to technological enhancement through the continued development of its Venue Management System (VMS). This comprehensive and innovative platform enables clubs to manage their entire operation from one place: from streamlined bookings to more direct communications, it has enriched the players' experience. Numbers of clubs using VMS grew in 2021, and Scottish Golf continued to onboard new clubs, increase its market share, all while providing excellent customer service to existing clients.

Pandemic notwithstanding, this year saw the very welcome return of golf events. Over 2,200 entries were recorded, signalling the enthusiasm and delight of the golfing community. Some real successes too, in Performance, most notably in the Women's and Girls' games. Louise Duncan and Hannah Darling deserve special mention, having won the Women's and Girls' Amateur championships respectively. These victories garnered them invitations to play at the Augusta National Women's Amateur in 2022. In Junior Golf, we saw over 2,500 participants as part of the new National Junior Golf Framework.

Ultimately, none of this is possible without the staunch and unflinching support of Scottish golf clubs, whose employees, volunteers and committees I would like to thank for their steadfastness in the face of continuing uncertainty.

I have been a prominent supporter of golf in Scotland for over 20 years. It is with immense pleasure that I look forward to my tenure as Chair of Scottish Golf, working with the team to grow, promote and support the game across the country.

Financial Review 20/21

Income £3,849,820

- Club Support expenditure increased from 44% (+6%) in 2019 and represents a real-terms increase even when offset against the uplift in supscriptions (+5%).
- Delivering a full Performance programme remained a challenge in 2021, navigating the ever-changing travel restrictions due to the pandemic. The planned investment and reduced expenditure contributed to an income surplus for the year. In the coming year Scottish Golf's ambitions are to return to the full complement of training and events and continue to grow opportunities for our top-performing golfers.
- Events expenditure increased with the return of a nearly-full programme in 2021 (+2%).
- Subscriptions income is +5% on pre-pandemic levels.
- Other income contribution decreased from 27% due to the 2020 R&A grant and other exceptional items.

Digital

The investment in technology continues to pay dividends. The Scottish Golf app saw a 78% rise in registered users in 2021. General Play scoring remained the most popular function, growing from 6,000 to over 409,000 rounds recorded in just one year. Digital scoring is becoming an increasingly important part of seamless game play, and the Scottish Golf app's link to WHS is a unique and popular feature.

The VMS system is available to affiliated clubs at no extra cost, and, among other features, enables direct tee time booking and communication between players and clubs.

Scottish Golf increased its market share in 2021 and has ambitions to continue the rollout of VMS across Scottish clubs.

SPENPLAY

Scottish Golf's commitment to opening up the game to new players is demonstrated in the continuing development of the OpenPlay app. Data collected from app users shows a lower age demographic, when compared to the club golfer by circa 15 years.

This suggests that younger players - interested in regular play, getting a handicap and competing at a high level are attracted by the flexible approach that the app offers. We are also already seeing OpenPlay members transition to club membership.

We remain confident that OpenPlay is an important tool in retaining new golfers who might have joined the game in the last two years, and in improving accessibility to golf in general.

World Handicap System

It's been over a year since the introduction of one of the biggest changes in golf in recent times. The new World Handicap System allows golfers in Scotland to have a handicap that they can use anywhere in the world.

Since 2 November 2020, in Scotland there have been an incredible 2,132,894 scores submitted through the system.

Scottish Golf App

We are delighted to see that there are over 142,000 registered accounts in Scotland for the Scottish Golf app. The app offers General Play scores, course look-up information, and is a valuable source of news and handicap information in Scotland.

International Scoring

Any Scottish Golfer with a WHS index who has registered for the app can submit their competition or General Play scores directly into the Scottish Golf app.

HIVE

The Scottish Golf HIVE learning system is now a year old. This online resource and engagement platform offers golf clubs direct and unlimited access to educational material and upskilling opportunities. Events, webinars, infographics and other instructional materials can be hosted

VMS HIVE

57,900 views 2,600 comments 678 reactions 268 active members on the platform, and can be accessed as required. Hive allows golf clubs the opportunity to feed back to the Scottish Golf team – and also interact and share knowledge with each other, encouraging peer-to-peer connections.

Performance

We are, as ever, extremely proud of the sporting talent that comes from Scotland. 2021 has seen some noteworthy performances, results, and team selections for Scottish golfers:



St Rule Trophy Hannah Darling won this championship with an impressive score of -18 over 3 rounds.

R&A Girls' Amateur Championship Hannah Darling became the first Scottish winner of this event since Clare Queen in 2001.

European Ladies Team Championship The team qualified in first place for the match play stages, with Hannah Darling finishing as leading qualifier. Scotland would eventually finish in 4th place, their best finish since 2010 where they won bronze.



Carmen Griffiths won the **Scottish Girls' Amateur Championship**.



Penny Brown was selected for the Arnold Palmer Cup International Team.



The Women's Amateur Championship Louise Duncan became the first Scottish winner of this event since Alison Rose in 1997.

Louise Duncan finished tied 10th in the **AIG Women's Open** at Carnoustie.


Golf Club Membership

The good news story from last year's growth in membership continues into 2021. A 7.3% increase in total playing membership of adults and juniors, and a total playing membership over 207,000 is a confident endorsement of the game's popularity in Scotland. Nine of our affiliated clubs saw an increase of over 100% in their membership numbers.

The challenge for 2022 will be to ensure golf retains those new players and encourages even more growth both for the health of the game and for golf clubs.

Junior Golf

This year saw the launch of the National Junior Framework, with 198 clubs registering in 2021. Much of the focus of 2021 has been on making it easier for golf clubs and Junior Convenors to access coaching and teaching materials, and expand opportunities to introduce competitive elements to young golfers. Golf Sixes, the season's most popular competition, was one of many real successes from 2021. Scottish Junior Golf will continue to build on this achievement.

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

Funding

A total of 98 affiliated clubs were supported by one of the following funds.

The successful delivery of nearly £60,000 of funding in 2021 was supported by the new HIVE platform, through which a series of educational webinars were delivered to clubs. The funds are designed to help clubs increase and retain membership, but also to broaden the offering to junior golfers and lay a pathway to competitive play.





Women in Golf Charter

Scottish Golf's Club Support team conducted the first review of the Women in Golf Charter in Scotland in December 2021 to measure progress. The results demonstrate a real commitment by clubs to advancing inclusivity and diversity in golf.

Of 248 contacts surveyed, 85% responded (211 total).

Clubs were surveyed on a number of access-broadening measures they had implemented or planned to implement in coming months. These included (but were not limited to):

- Peak tee times being made available regardless of gender
- Combined prize-giving
- Overall commitment to increasing female membership and equality of membership
- Recruitment, volunteering opportunites and Board-level representation
- Supporting campaigns that help improve the perception of Women's Golf

The results confirm that the Charter is encouraging clubs to plan for positive change, as most clubs returned 'Completed' or 'In Progress' answers for each measure.

The pandemic put paid to our entire Events schedule in 2020, so it was a delight to return to a healthy complement in 2021. International travel remained a challenge, and cross-border domestic journeys were not uncomplicated. However, with the exception of the Boys' and Girls' Opens, which we were unable to reschedule from their early season calendar position, other National Championships returned with gusto. Participation numbers signalled a renewed appetite for competitive golf, and Scottish Golf plan to capitalise on this momentum with an even broader events programme next year.
